
NATIONAL SIMULTANEOUS STORYTIME

SENIOR ROOM NEWS

WRITING: TEXT BASED UNIT

Students have continued working on our text-based unit, The Thing About Oliver. We read together as a class and now hold reading groups twice a week. In these groups, students take turns reading and support each other when needed. Together, we set group expectations—such as taking turns, helping kindly, not interrupting, and demonstrating our school values. After reading, students discuss and respond to comprehension questions, which includes looking for evidence within the text. This encourages a deeper understanding of the material and helps to build their collaboration skills. These sessions have strengthened both reading confidence and group work skills. We have also had some incredibly insightful and purposeful discussions around autism and neurodivergence as this is a main theme in the text. Students have shown a high level of maturity, respect and kindness during these discussions and it is great to see. Well done Seniors!









NUMERACY

We have been working through our numeracy assessments for semester 1 reporting and students have shown a lot of persistence and confidence. We will now continue our unit on multiplication, which is tailored to suit each students



individual points of need.
Some areas being explored are fluency in times tables, arrays, multiplication and division links, BODMAS, and worded problems.

FORREST FRIDAYS

A huge thank you to Freya and Dan for coming to speak to the middles and seniors about nesting boxes. Freya and Dan spoke about the different types of animals we may see around our school and how to determine the best trees and areas for nesting boxes. We are so excited to gather materials and create some new cosy homes for our animal friends. Thank you, Dan and Freya!





MIDDLE ROOM NEWS

Almost half way through this Term! It's flying by.. It's been awesome to see the Middle Kids growth in different learning areas, as well as their capacity to challenge themselves. So far, we have been practicing our recount

writing in response to different moments in life as well as in response to texts where students get to use their imagination to come up with their own narratives of a recount. We just completed one in

response to the picture book Gary – A story about a pigeon who can't fly. The students had to plan an adventurous day in the life of Gary and write it as a recount. Some students decided to plan and write about a day where Gary went to a concert, to see the Titanic shipwreck, to visit the pandas in China as well as trips to the footy and the zoo!

In Math, students have been building on their multiplication fluency with their 2 and 3 times tables. We have also explored different multiplication strategies to help us solve

multiplication number problems. We have enjoyed practicing our fluency with whole class games and detective problem solving!

A focus for the Middle kids this week has been on the choice of our words! We have been exploring

affirmations as a tool to help us navigate with a more positive outlook in and outside of the classroom. The students have worked together as a class to

create a Middle Room Affirmation Deck. We have also built on this



by giving everyone in the classroom an affirmation themselves. It's been warming to see the kids build on their understanding on affirmations and the value they have on bringing kindness and belief in themselves and others!

Last week, we took part in the National Simultaneous Storytime, a wonderful

nationwide
initiative that
brings children
together to
share a story at
the same time.
The chosen
book this year
was The Truck
Cat, a
beautifully

written and illustrated story that opened up conversations around cats and humans, immigration, identity, and finding a home after loss.

Our students thoroughly enjoyed the story and connected with its heartfelt message. We used The Truck
Cat as an opportunity for
learning about prepositional
phrases and developing
extended sentences by
answering the question
"Where?" For example,
students described where the

cat slept,
where the
truck
travelled,
and where
the
characters
found
comfort
and
belonging.

It's been fantastic to see their vocabulary and sentence structure grow through meaningful and engaging literature.

RECONCILIATION WEEK

This week is Reconciliation
Week, and we've turned our
attention to the important
themes of truth, respect, and
unity. The children are
learning about what
reconciliation means and why
it is significant—especially in
understanding and valuing
Aboriginal and Torres Strait
Islander cultures. Through
stories and discussions, we are
exploring the idea of coming
together to build respectful
relationships.

To celebrate and reflect, we are creating a collaborative artwork that will express our students' ideas about connection, culture, and community. We can't wait to see their creative ideas come to life and to share the finished piece with you all!

WELLBEING NEWS

Australian parenting website 'Raising Children' has some great information about raising children of all ages. The following is some information with tips and strategies for 'Talking about school'.

KEY POINTS

- Talking about school with children and teenagers shows you're interested in their lives and learning.
- It's best to start conversations about school

- when the moment seems right and your child seems ready to talk.
- Get younger children talking by asking simple and positive questions about school.
- As children move into the senior years, you could try talking about the links between study and postschool plans.

Simple, positive and specific questions about parts of the day can get your child talking. It's good to use questions that invite more than a 'yes', 'no' or 'OK' response. For example:

- What's the news from school today?
- · What was fun?
- What did you like best at school today?
- What does your classroom look like at the moment?

- What did you do in class after recess?
- Who did you hang out with today?
- What subjects did you do today?
- What topics are you working on in science at the moment?

TIPS FOR TALKING ABOUT SCHOOL WITH PRIMARY SCHOOL CHILDREN

These tips can help you communicate well with your child:

- Make time to talk. This can
 often be when you're doing
 something with your child.
 For example, your child
 might like to talk when you're
 walking the dog or preparing
 dinner together.
- Give your child your full attention if they want to talk with you about their day.
- Take seriously whatever your child tells you. For example, you can say things like, 'That's interesting. Then what happened?' or 'And how do you feel about that?'
- Use respectful language
 when you talk about the
 school and teachers with or in
 front of your child. For
 example, 'I can see that's
 frustrating, but Ms Adams is
 your teacher and you need to
 speak respectfully to her', or
 'Yes, that seems unfair, but
 perhaps you don't know the
 whole story'.
- Use active listening techniques. These can help you pick up on your child's feelings and work out whether they want to talk.

EARLY YEARS CENTRE NEWS

These last couple of weeks have seen the children explore some very important topics, Road Safety, Germs and Bees.

During Road Safety week the children discussed the dangers that can appear near a road, the importance of walking close to fence lines and how to be aware of driveways before creating their own towns and recognizing dangers in everyday life.

The children all read books and watched a short video on

the spread of germs, how fast and easy they can spread, how to cough into our elbow and blow our noses with the added importance of washing our hands.

World Bee Day was this week, and the children talked about how Bees are important, how they ensure survival of all species, how they collect pollen and the fact that they have 2 stomachs!

The cold weather has definitely hit us with a bang so I remind all parents to please keep your children home if they are unwell with coughs and colds. Coughing and runny noses, especially green, are both signs of infection and are a sign that your child should remain at home and rest until the infection passes. These things spread quickly among young children and we strive to keep everyone as healthy as possible so we appreciate your help on this matter.

Community Firewood Collection Cemetery Road, Yaugher



May 202

Forest Fire Management Victoria will be conducting a community firewood collection trial in the Yaugher Forest Block, Otway Forest Park. This work builds on operations conducted through April 2024.

Domestic firewood collection in the Otway Forest Park has previously required off-road access by vehicles and trailers. This has caused high levels of disturbance to soils and understorey vegetation.

From late May, a community firewood trial will be conducted at Cemetery and Centre roads (see map overleaf).

The trial aims to support forest health by reducing disturbance to the forest, while making firewood more accessible to the community. $\frac{1}{2} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{1}{2} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty}$

A collection point will be established where firewood will be available during the collection period. We will let the community know when it opens.

Ongoing monitoring will evaluate forest health.

What's planned:

- The planned trial site is in a small area of foothill forest. Works will begin in late May 2025 (weather permitting).
- Access will be restricted, with road and trail closures in place for public safety.
- Machines will be in the area thinning forests and moving firewood to the collection point.
- Healthy trees, hollow bearing habitat trees and some logs and large branches (coarse woody debris) will be retained across the thinned area to enhance habitat.
- A new firewood collection area will open nearby for the community following these


Future actions:

- FFMVic crews will continue to manually remove some of the regrowth (coppice) from areas of previously treated forest.
- Mosaic (small patch) burning is planned to follow these works. This will include
 opportunities for planned burns with Eastern Maar Aboriginal Corporation.
- Forest health monitoring and evaluation has been conducted at this site, and will be ongoing. This information will help inform forest management decisions.

Traffic Management

Centre Road and Cemetery Road will be CLOSED during operations. Some heavy vehicle traffic will utilise the Yaugher road network supporting management activities.

Mountain bike trails will be closed adjacent to the works zone for public safety. Rolling closures will affect Marriners Run, Foxtail, and Yaugher Super Loop.

Operations will be complete within five working days. All closed roads and trails will be opened as soon as operations have concluded.
